POLICY GCN – Teacher Growth, Supervision & Evaluation

The Board recognizes that it is responsible for ensuring that the highest possible quality of education is provided for its students. It believes that the standard of quality teaching can be achieved by providing opportunities for professional growth of teachers, by having the expectation that teachers will utilize the opportunities for professional development and by providing for effective teacher supervision and evaluation.

GUIDELINES & PROCEDURES

1. The policy shall apply to all teachers employed by the school board under continuing and probationary contracts and temporary or interim contracts of three months or more.
2. Teachers shall submit an annual teacher professional growth plan to the Principal by October 31st of each school year for review and approval.
3. An annual teacher professional growth plan:
 - a) reflects goals and objectives based on self-assessment of learning needs by the individual teacher,
 - b) shows a demonstrable relationship to the teaching quality standard, and
 - c) takes into consideration the education plans of the school, the Board, and Alberta Education.
4. The growth plan identifies the goals to be achieved, the types of activities in which to be engaged, results/measures and timelines for the completion of those activities.
5. If a teacher fails to submit an annual teacher professional growth plan by the date specified above or fails to work towards achieving the goals identified in the plan, the Principal shall provide the teacher with notice in writing that this may result in disciplinary action within the parameters defined within the School act.
6. A Principal may identify an area requiring supervision or evaluation that is identical or similar to that which is contained in the teacher's growth plan, so long as the particular concern arose from sources other than the teacher's growth plan.
7. As part of the supervision process a Principal will maintain an awareness of a teacher's professional growth plan, the status of progression toward achieving the goal(s) of the plan and may include the provision of guidance and assistance in implementing and/or achieving the plan.
8. A Principal may identify behaviors or practices that may require an evaluation separate from the contents of the annual professional growth plan.

9. Prior to the end of the school year each teacher will meet with the Principal to discuss the implementation of the growth plans as well as professional growth needs and any implication for the next planning cycle.
10. Supervision of teachers shall be an ongoing process carried out by the Principal to:
 - a) recognize the teacher's success in meeting Teaching Quality Standard,
 - b) provide support and guidance to the teacher,
 - c) observe and receive information about the quality of teaching a teacher provides to students, and
 - d) identify the behaviors or practices of a teacher that for any reason may require an evaluation.
11. The evaluation of a teacher by a Principal may be conducted:
 - a) upon the written request of the teacher,
 - b) for the purposes of gathering information related to a specific employment decision,
 - c) for purposes of assessing the growth of the teacher in specific areas of practice, and
 - d) when, on the basis of information received through supervision, the Principal has reason to believe that the teaching of the teacher may not meet the Teaching Quality Standard.
12. Teachers who hold an Interim Professional Teaching Certificate or who are employed under a contract other than a continuing contract will have comprehensive evaluation in addition to on-going supervision.
13. Teachers who hold a Permanent Professional Teaching Certificate and are employed under a continuing contract will have on-going supervision but will not receive comprehensive evaluation except as in 11(a) and/or 11(d).
14. The process of teacher supervision and evaluation shall be conducted in a fair and consistent manner.
 - a) A schedule of evaluation will be developed by the Principal and provided to staff at the beginning of each school year.
 - b) There shall be standard criteria known to staff consistent with the Teaching Quality Standard.
15. Teachers on Probationary Contracts and on Temporary or Interim contracts of 3 (three) or more months duration will be evaluated in the following manner:
 - a) It is the responsibility of the Principal to ensure that teachers on these contracts are aware of this policy and any other policies that apply to their assignments. The Principal may exempt teachers with a recent written evaluation for similar assignments in the same school.

- b) A written evaluation report shall be based upon a minimum of two visits, at least one of which shall be with advance notice.
 - c) Each visit or series of visits to the classroom will be followed by a conference between the teacher and evaluator.
 - d) The evaluation process shall include observations of the teacher's performance, a post conference and a written report.
 - e) For teachers on probationary contracts and teachers on temporary or interim contracts, the first visit shall be made within the first 30 working days of the school year or contract period.
 - f) Final evaluation reports will be completed and received by the teacher by May 15th
 - g) The report will have a place for the teacher's signature indicating receipt of the document as well as space to enter comments. A copy of the evaluation report shall be forwarded to the teacher and central office and a copy maintained in the Principal's office
16. Teachers eligible for permanent certification will be evaluated as in #15 above. The recommendation for permanent certification will be forwarded to the Superintendent after meeting the Alberta Education requirement.
17. Teachers on continuing contracts may be evaluated in the following manner if the Principal has reason to believe that the teacher's performance may not meet the Teaching Quality Standard and Peace Wapiti School Board standards and expectations:
- a) On initiating an evaluation, the Principal shall meet and communicate explicitly, in writing to the teacher:
 - i) the reason for the evaluation,
 - ii) the process, criteria and standards to be used,
 - iii) the timeline to be applied,
 - iv) the possible outcome of the evaluation,
 - b) The report shall have a place for the teacher's signature indicating receipt of the report and space to enter comments. A copy of the Principal's evaluation report shall be forwarded to the teacher and a copy maintained in the Principal's office.
 - c) If, as a result of an evaluation, a Principal determines that a change in the behavior or practice of a teacher is required, the Principal must provide to the teacher a notice of remediation.
 - d) A notice of remediation issued by the Principal shall be a written statement to the teacher where the Principal has determined that the teacher does not meet the Teaching Quality Standards. The notice shall describe:

- i) the behavior and practices that do not meet the teaching quality standard and changes required,
 - ii) the remediation strategies that the teacher is required to pursue and the timeline within which this must be done,
 - iii) how the determination will be made that the required changes in behavior or practice have taken place, and the consequences of not achieving the required changes including, but not limited to, termination of the teacher's contract of employment.
18. A teacher shall have the right to appeal an evaluation of his/her teaching performance.
- a) Any appeal shall be made, in writing, to the Superintendent of Schools within ten (10) teaching days of receipt of the written evaluation report. The teacher shall state clearly the reason(s) the evaluation is being contested.
 - b) Within ten operational days of receipt of an appeal, the Superintendent shall consider the appeal, review the relevant documents and make a decision on the appeal.
 - c) The Superintendent shall determine whether or not a re-evaluation is warranted, and shall respond in writing to the teacher within an additional five (5) operational days.
 - d) In the event that the superintendent finds that a re-evaluation is warranted, he/she shall identify a new evaluator and the time and manner of any re-evaluation. The new evaluator shall not be given the particulars of the previous evaluation.
 - e) Should a re-evaluation be denied, the teacher may appeal to the Board in writing within five (5) days of the Superintendent's decision.
19. A Principal shall recommend disciplinary or other action, as appropriate, where he/she has reasonable grounds for believing that the actions or practices of a teacher endanger the safety of students, constitutes a neglect of duty, a breach of trust or a refusal to obey a lawful order of the Board. In those cases where the Principal deems that suspension is warranted, the Principal shall be required to make a recommendation to the Superintendent with supporting documentation.
